Topic Number 4:

Mining and Environmental Cleanup Can Happen Together

EPA's work to clean up contamination can happen alongside mining operations.

The proposed cleanup would address historical contamination from mining activities that began in the late 1880s. Back then, mine waste disposal practices were much different than they are today. For example, until 1968, mine waste could be legally discharged directly into creeks and rivers. Today, existing mining activities are regulated by state and federal laws.

EPA is confident that cleanup and responsible mining can continue together. Where cleanup is planned in areas that are being mined, developed, or expanded, EPA would coordinate investigation, design, and cleanup work with the property owners. This approach would allow EPA to work with mining companies as cleanup is implemented.

Cleanup is not expected to restrict future mining and exploration in the Silver Valley. EPA knows that mining is an important part of the history and future of the Silver Valley. EPA also understands that mining companies need certainty for planning and investing. We are committed to completing cleanup actions in ways that would allow responsible mining operations to continue in compliance with environmental regulations.
